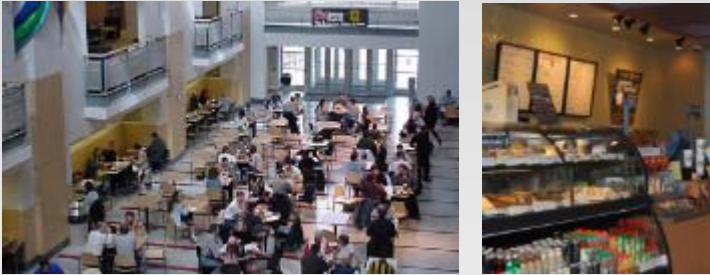

PROJECT OBJECTIVES



- ❖ To understand how current spaces are being used, qualitative demand, and competitive market position.

- ❖ To supply UCLA with a **gap analysis** and **recommendations for future study and growth.**



- ❖ First component to a comprehensive study / master plan.

FOCUS GROUPS



- ❖ Focus groups & interviews held
 - » April 20, 2011
 - » April 21, 2011
 - » April 22, 2011
 - » May 3, 2011
- ❖ Conversations with 118 students and staff
- ❖ Qualitative assessment / breadth of issues



FOCUS GROUPS - GENERAL

- ❖ Variety of reasons to attend UCLA (academic excellence, family connection, campus diversity, attractive environment)
- ❖ Several students didn't look at other options once accepted into UCLA, unaware of competitor's facilities
- ❖ Overall, limited indoor and outdoor spaces are impacting students ability to utilize services and participate in activities
- ❖ Diverse student body, but demographics separation remain, potentially impacting retention of minority students

FOCUS GROUPS - UNION

- ❖ Viewed as primary destination for food services and bookstore
- ❖ Meeting and lounge spaces severely impacted during peak times, with mismatched room sizes / options
- ❖ Wayfinding within the facilities is challenging to students
- ❖ Efficient use of what space is available within Ackerman and Kerckhoff
- ❖ Insufficient space to meet the needs of general students and student organizations

FOCUS GROUPS - RECREATION

- ❖ Great facility but crowded with limited space and equipment at peak times – impacts self-directed and group fitness
- ❖ Outdoor space severely limited by number of users, types of users, and condition of fields
- ❖ Frustration between drop-in users, IM users, and class users
- ❖ Some concerns over wayfinding and perceived gender specific areas
- ❖ Sunset Canyon environment viewed positively, valuable space in urban environment
- ❖ Overall, few comments related to lack of outdoor aquatics

FOCUS GROUPS - ACTIVITIES

- ❖ Many students did not know what all was housed within the SAC, even after walking through the facility
- ❖ Provides a home for many groups with an identity, but limited space available to use
- ❖ Performance groups have limited access to appropriate facilities for practice – currently use sidewalks, parking structures, etc.
- ❖ Student org utilization and demand of outdoor space is very high

Focus Group Comments:

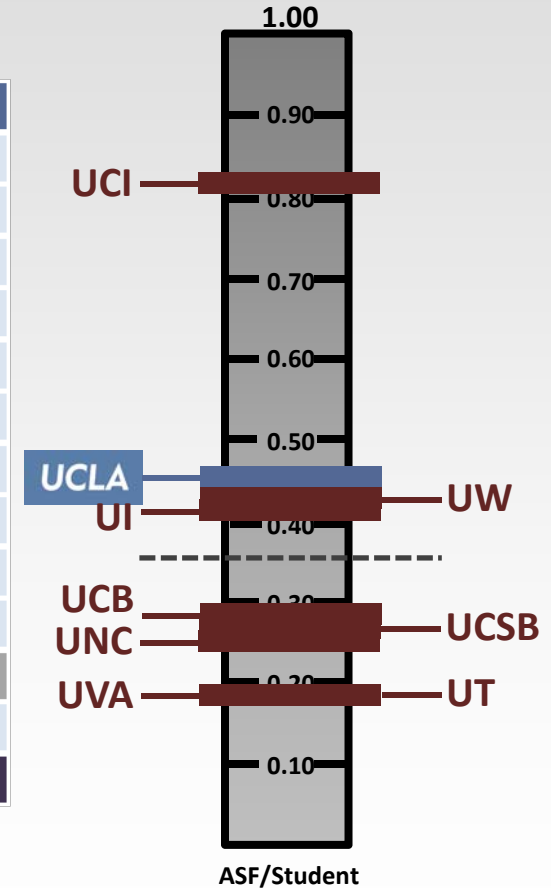
- ❖ Ballroom is large, under utilized, “old” but a “nice space”

- ❖ “More flat performance space is needed”
- ❖ Schools: Morgan State (top) and UCSD (bottom)

Focus Group Comments:

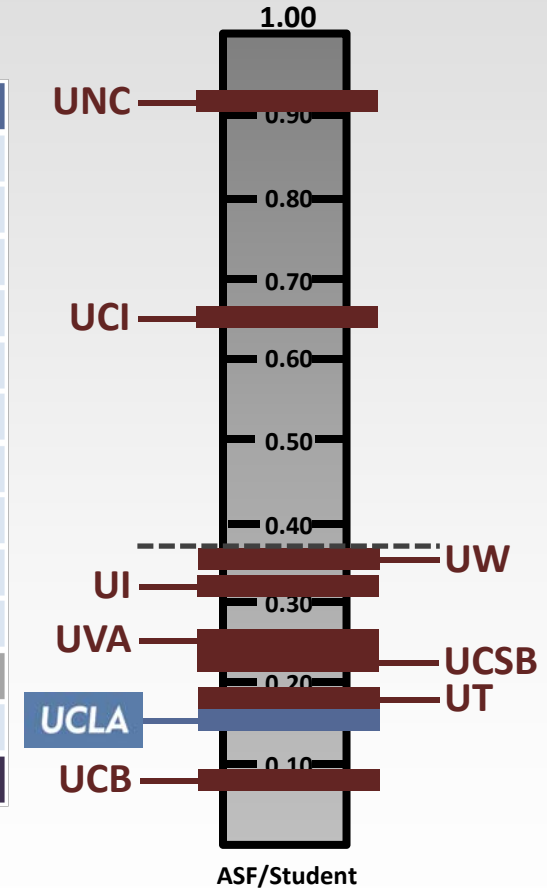
- ❖ Most rooms adequately sized & high quality but lack whiteboards & A/V
- ❖ Not enough meeting rooms for all clubs/orgs; some times use professional staff's office (150 SF) for meetings
- ❖ Difficulty reserving rooms 2 weeks in advance due to unavailability; would like an online scheduling system
- ❖ Schools: UCSD (top) and Illinois (bottom)

Focus Group Comments:

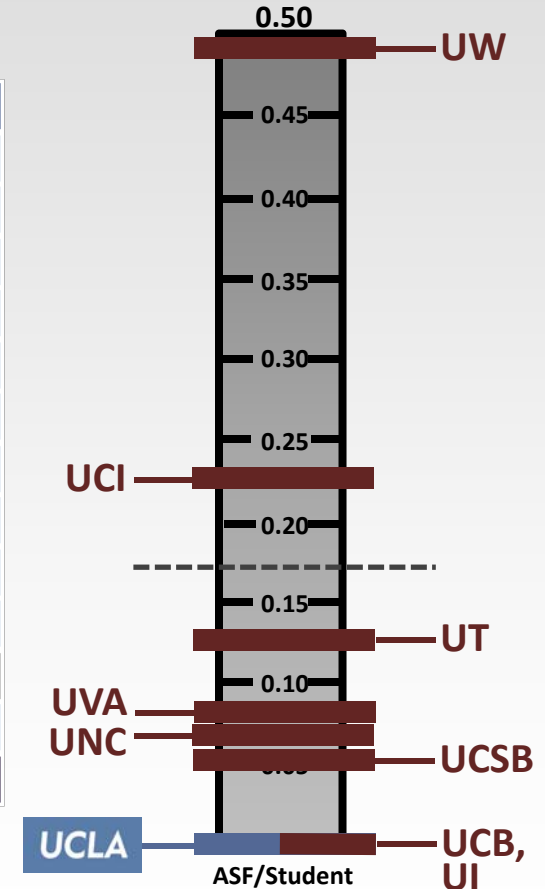
- ❖ Using Royce Hall for large events but is too expensive for most organizations

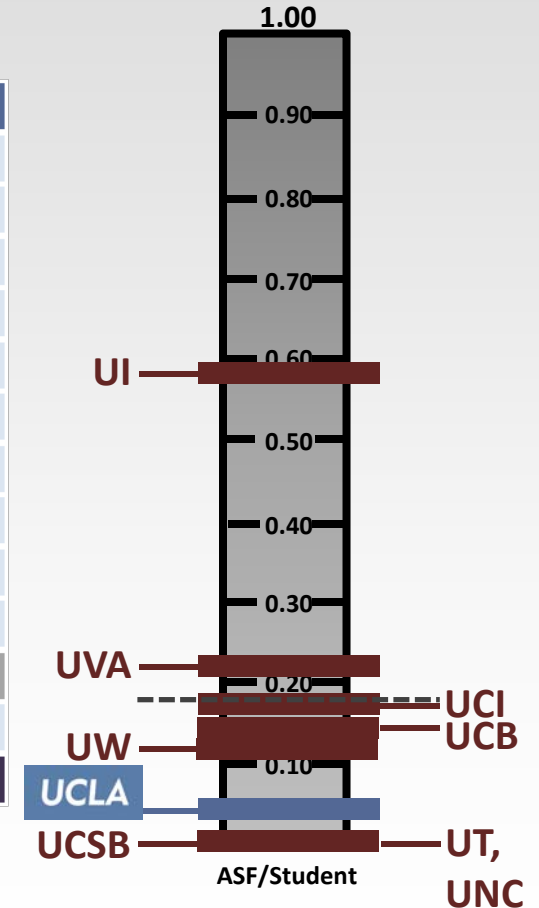
- ❖ No centralized space for indoor recreational activities like ping pong, bowling, pool, etc.

 - ❖ Arts & Crafts

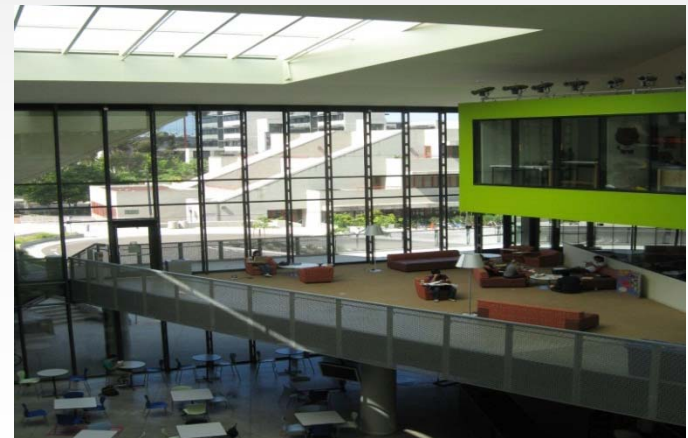

Focus Group Comments:

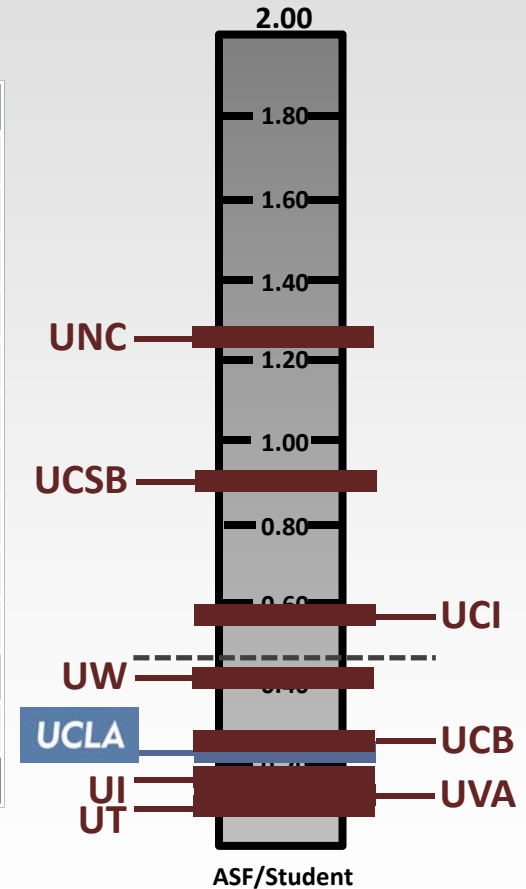
- ❖ Lounge space in Kerckhoff is good for studying but Ackerman lounges are louder and for socializing

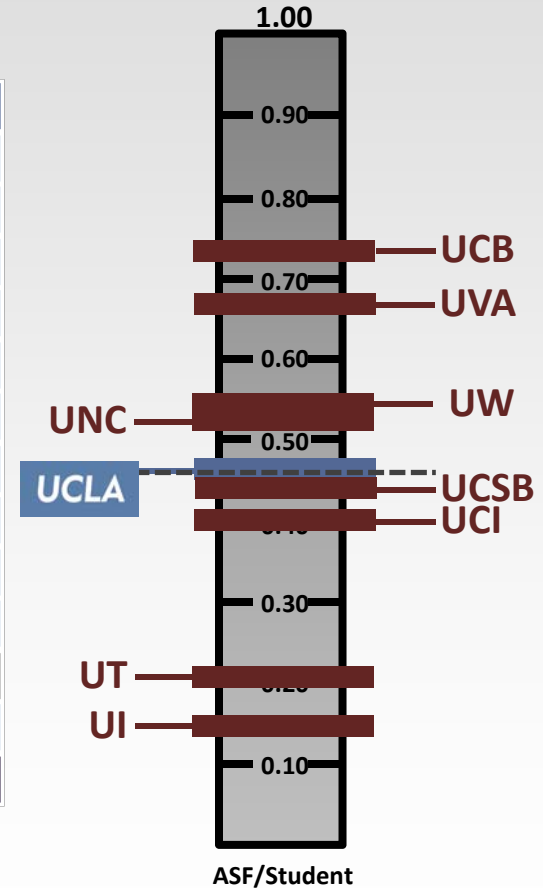
- ❖ Students feel a competition for spaces among other clubs & organizations

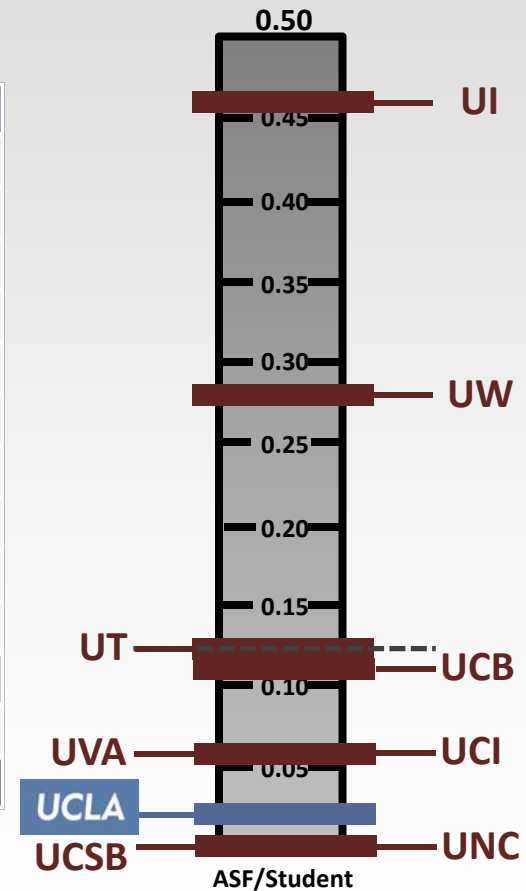
- ❖ Lack of central multicultural space with kitchen area for large potlucks/events

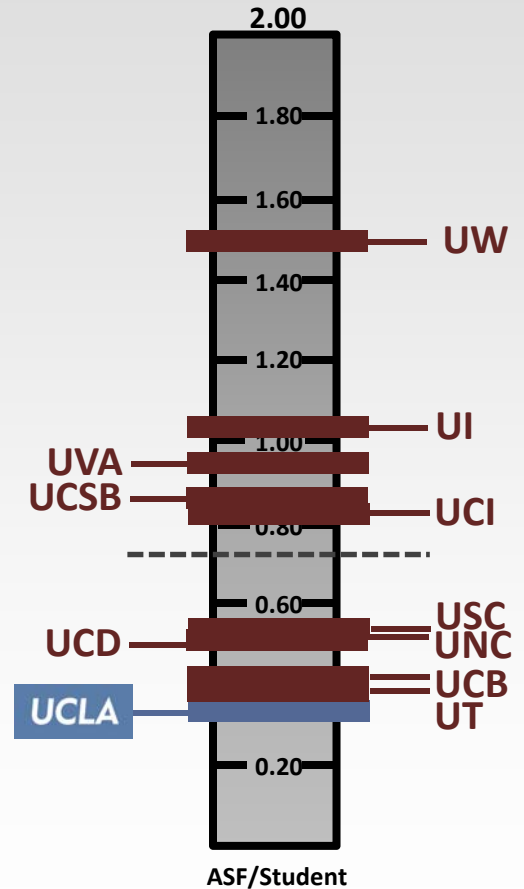
- ❖ Weight room is not large enough to accommodate student demand and variety of interests

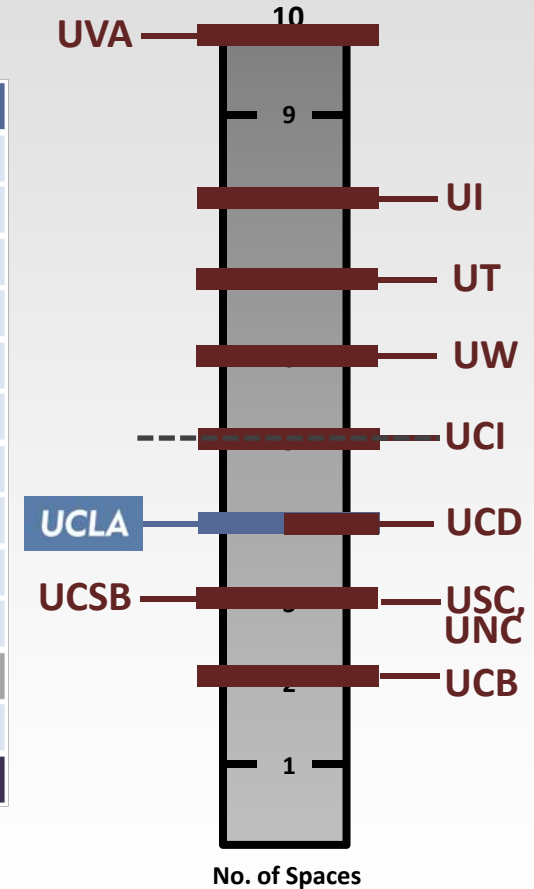
- ❖ Students currently using garage parking areas for dance/recital practices; would like hardwood floors

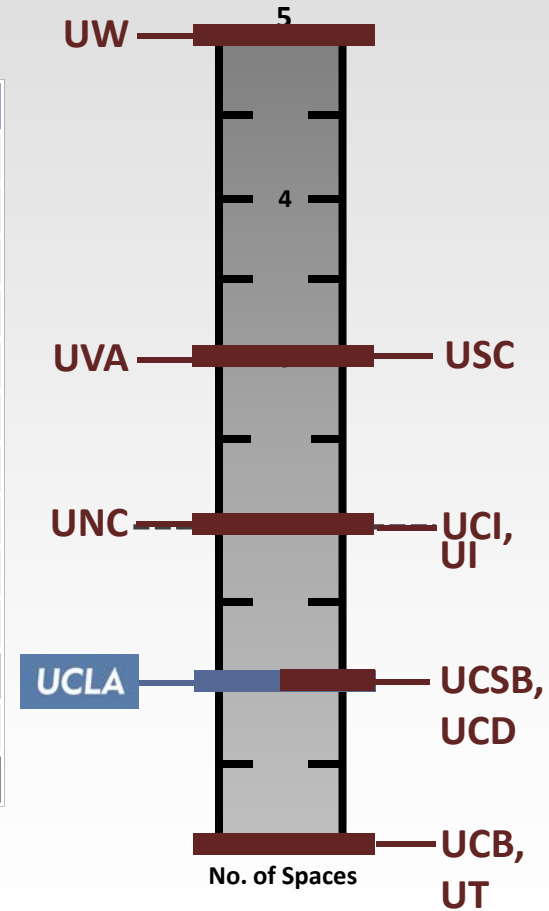
- ❖ Good general space for a variety of sports

- ❖ Schools: UC Davis (top) and UC Irvine (bottom)

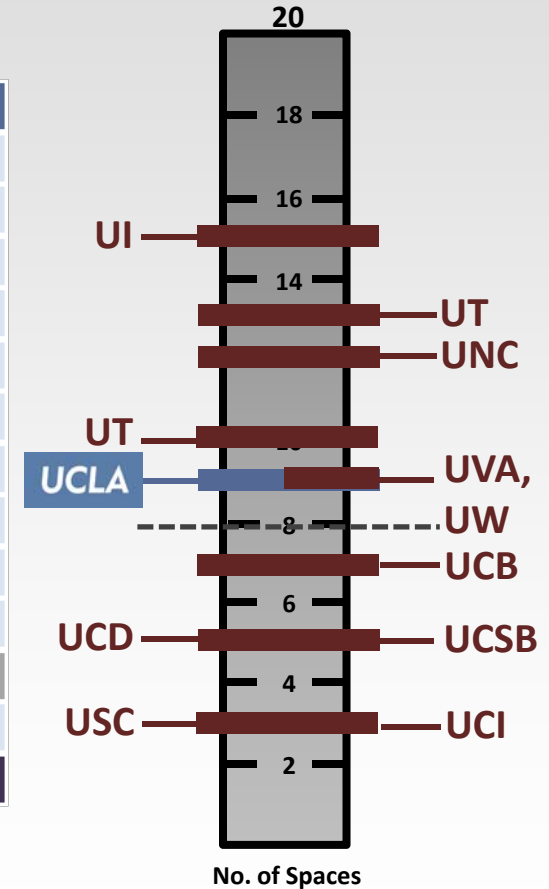

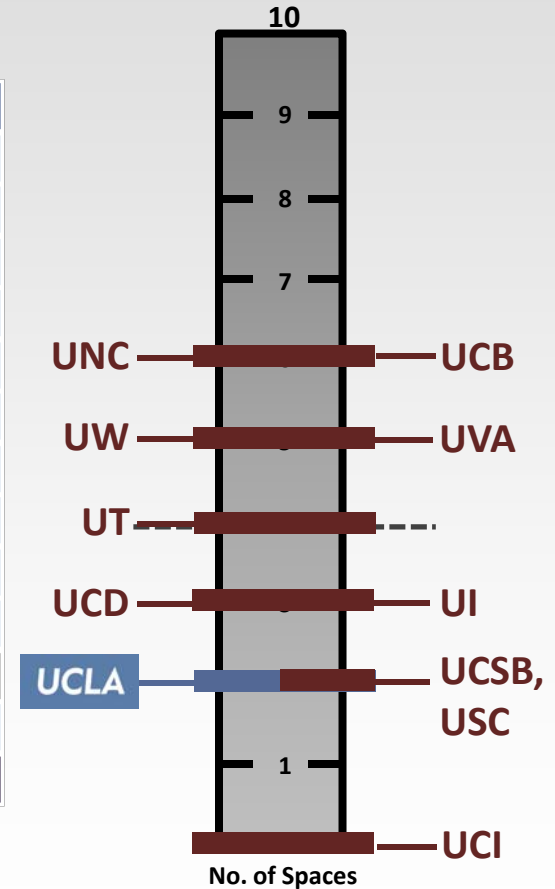

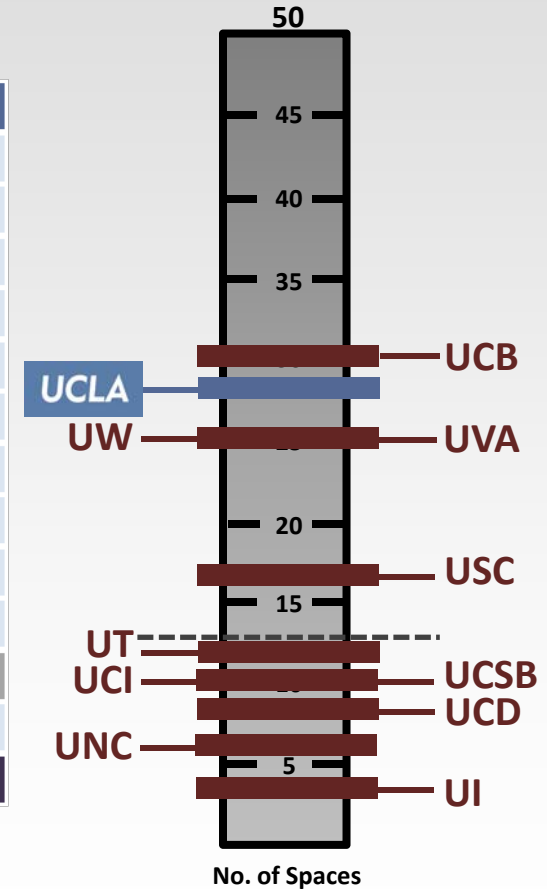

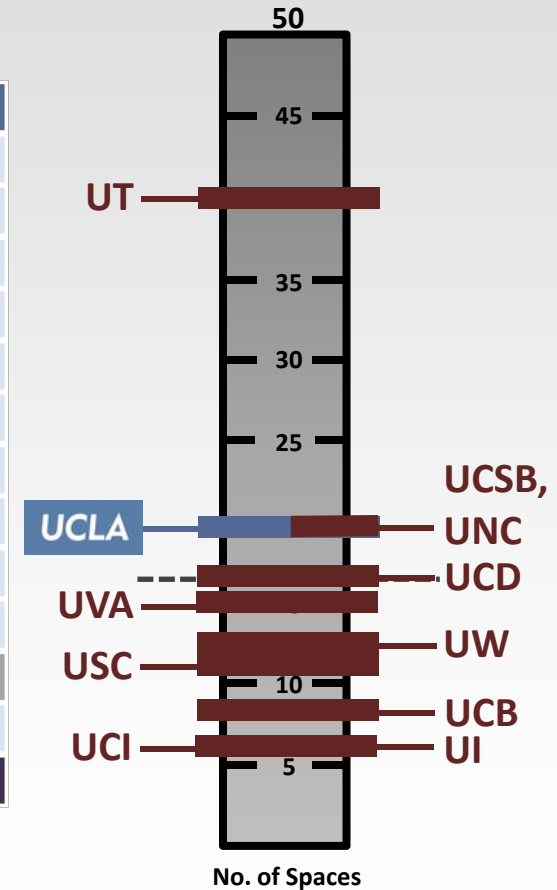

GAP ANALYSIS

- ❖ Synthesis of Analyses
 - ❖ Benchmarking Only One Component of Assessing Demand
 - ❖ Qualitative Data, National Trends, and B&D Experience Factor into Recommendations
- ❖ Identifies Gaps Between Existing Space and Qualitative Demand and Quantitative Comparisons
- ❖ Provides Insight on Direction Moving Forward

GAP ANALYSIS – UNION

- ❖ Main gaps in Union facilities:
 - ❖ Student organizations / cultural groups
 - ❖ Theater / auditorium
 - ❖ General performance space
 - ❖ Lounge / study space
 - ❖ Meeting rooms – ballroom appears to be sufficient

- ❖ Preliminary gap estimated between 40,000gsf to 100,000gsf

GAP ANALYSIS – RECREATION

- ❖ Overall recreation space is less than national metrics, and less than peers
 - ❖ Wooden Center served as the model for contemporary recreation facilities across the country – limited by trends at that time
 - ❖ Sunset Canyon setting in the UCLA urban setting is a unique and highly valuable environment for students and campus community

GAP ANALYSIS – RECREATION

- ❖ Main gaps in Recreation facilities:
 - ❖ Weight and fitness spaces – 1asf / student
 - ❖ Group fitness/Multi – 0.6asf - 0.75asf / student
 - ❖ Programmed court space
 - ❖ Open field space – up to 1 acre / 1,000 students

- ❖ Preliminary gap estimated between 65,000gsf to 125,000gsf of indoor space

RECOMMENDATIONS

- ❖ Master plan to formalize and quantify physical space needs, specifically addressing:
 - ❖ General student activity needs
 - ❖ Student organization general and programmatic needs
 - ❖ Student life / activities programmatic needs
 - ❖ Self-directed fitness space demand
 - ❖ Group fitness space demand
 - ❖ Detailed scheduling analysis for optimal programming of performance, multipurpose, and meeting rooms

RECOMMENDATIONS

- ❖ Develop a space plan to address demand and investigate on campus and off-campus opportunities
 - ❖ Strategic focus on central campus zone
 - ❖ Strategic focus on NW housing and recreation zone
- ❖ Strategic visioning with students and campus administration focusing on how the follow aspects of student spaces affect UCLA:
 - ❖ Educational outcomes
 - ❖ Enrollment management
 - ❖ Campus community
 - ❖ Financial performance
